"True, the Jewish authorities and those who followed their lead pressed for the death of Christ; (13) still, what happened in His passion cannot be charged against all the Jews, without distinction, then alive, nor against the Jews of today. Although the Church is the new people of God, the Jews should not be presented as rejected or accursed by God, as if this followed from the Holy Scriptures. All should see to it, then, that in catechetical work or in the preaching of the word of God they do not teach anything that does not conform to the truth of the Gospel and the spirit of Christ.

Furthermore, in her rejection of every persecution against any man, the Church, mindful of the patrimony she shares with the Jews and moved not by political reasons but by the Gospel's spiritual love, decries hatred, persecutions, displays of anti-Semitism, directed against Jews at any time and by anyone."

Dear Colleagues and Friends.

Luna Kaufman, president of Tomple Sholom in Plainfield, and a tireless worker in endeavoring to spread the message of this event in recent history, so awesome in its devastation, so cosmic in its significance and so universal in its implications, will be present as our special guest. Mrs. Kaufman, a survivor who was in concentration camps both in Poland and in Germany, will share with us some of her personal reflections, as well as those expressed by Gevernor Kean in an address given recently at an interfaith Holocaust observance in Plainfield.

Many people still regard the Holocaust as a matter of Jowish concern, but nothing could be farther from the truth. Increasing numbers of high schools, colleges and universities are including study units on the Holocaust and Genocide in their curricula.

Perhaps Rabbi Gerald Goldman has reached the heart of this issue when he warns us "not to forget the lessons of the Holocaust: how racism poisons and eventually murders the human heart, how rabid nationalism turns plowshares into swords and pruninghooks into spears, how willingly men and woman and even children will hand up their consciences to a demagogue who promises them power and immortality. The tragic events of the Holocaust force upon us the urgency to confront and remove racism from our hearts, to protect and defend our Constitutional guarantees of public and personal freedoms, and lastly, to give our hearts and souls to the pursuit of peace and understanding among the nations of our world."

Through a local committee representing the various racial, religious and ethnic groups in Union Township, we want to plan at least one annual educational program dealing with these issues.

If you cannot attend the meeting on June 1, may I urge you to sand another person from your congregation or organization.

In accordance with Public Law 96-388, the United States Holocaust Memorial Council proclaims this period "in memory of the victims of the Holocaust, and with the hope that we will strive always to evercome prejudice and inhumanity through vigilance and resistance".

Less than forty years ago, six million Jews were murdered in the Nazi Holocaust - part of a systematic program of genocide - and millions of other people suffered as victims of Nazism.

We have a great responsibility to make everyone aware of this dark spoch in human history and to share the lessons growing out of it so that never again will such an appelling fate come to any people, any nation, anywhere in the world.


