DIPL 6002 Policy Analysis Assignment:

- Students work in pairs and are randomly assigned an International Organization.
- Students have to identify a barrier to that organization's effectiveness
- Students then outline two strategies to overcome that barrier
- They weigh the costs and benefits of each and decide which strategy is superior
- They then discuss how their preferred strategy should be implemented

Assignment Deliverables (Worth 50% of overall grade, as follows):

- Student teams first submit an annotated bibliography that is intended to help them identify a the barrier (5%)
- Student teams then submit a policy analysis paper which includes all of the steps noted above (25%)
- Student teams then distill their findings down to an 800 word op-ed which is posted on the class blog (reforminginternationalorganizations.wordpress.com) (15%)
- Students finally submit a peer evaluation of each other to guard against free-riding (5%)
