Senate Library Committee Report

October 8, 2021 Meeting of the Senate

The Senate Library Committee met on September 27, 2021 to discuss the "2021 Return to Campus Library Uses Survey" (see Report below).

The committee members observed that the survey indicates that, among faculty, current preferences for library instruction modality vary (in-person, virtual, hybrid). Preliminary data from Fall 2021 also show strong interest in both in-person and remote instruction on the South Orange Campus. Instruction on the IHS campus this semester is mostly in-person.

The committee recognizes that students are best served when course instructors and Library faculty work together to determine which modality is best suited for course-specific research instruction. We commend the Library for offering both in-person and remote instruction.

Because many faculty request instruction in the Library's instructional spaces, the committee also strongly supports efforts to increase the functionality of these spaces, including updating older equipment to align with instructional technology available in most classrooms.

We also commend the Library for maintaining the "home delivery" borrowing option.



during the past 12 months?




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Q4 - How satisfied were you with virtual library instruction, if you had any librarian visit

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


In person if all the students have been vaccinated for COVID 19. The safety of the presenter and their family is a priority and the presentation can be given using Microsoft Teams.


I would utilize both; while home and working, I would obviously utilize the library's resources virtually. On campus, however, I will utilize them inperson.
