The 2010 Polar Bear Plunge took place on Saturday, March 6<sup>th</sup> in Seaside Heights, New Jersey. This was the fourth consecutive year that SPLASH members pledged a minimum of \$100 to jump into the icy waters of the Atlantic in the heart of winter.

At this point, you may be questioning our association's sanity, but rest assured that these efforts were made to support a great cause. All proceeds from the Polar Bear Plunge help advance the goal of Special Olympics New Jersey to provide free training and competition to more than 18,000 children and adults with intellectual disabilities. This year, over 4,500 participants raised more than \$1.2 million to help fund the creation and expansion of Special Olympic programs in New Jersey. The SPLASH team singlehandedly contributed an astounding \$1,483 to the cause.

The NASP 2010 Annual Convention was held March 2-6 at the Hyatt Regency in the windy city this year! The convention attracted it's second largest attendance with just over 6,000 school psychologists and graduate students. NASP's 2010 theme, *Promoting Competence, Creating Capacity, and Expanding Opportunities*, encompassed an array of professional excellence to strengthen the role of school psychologists on children's learning and mental health in schools.

SPLASH students took advantage of all opportunities at NASP: workshops, poster sessions, convention assistants, the student mentoring program, and networking with colleagues and friends. Some attended session topics include:

- School Wide Positive Behavior Supports (SWPBS) & Response to Intervention (RTI)
- Data-based Decision Making
- Various Mental Health Topics
- Best Practices / Evidence-based Research
- Suicide Prevention & Intervention
- Bullying/Cyberbullying
- Multicultural Competency Topics

And after a full day of productive professional development, the excitement did not stop there! As the third largest city in America, students were able to enjoy the windy city's culture, dining and history.

SPLASH students Jackie Karlsson, Ashley Pagan and Brad Harris presented A Program to Counteract the Effects of Violent Video Games in a Participant Information Exchange (PIE) format. The presentation was interactive and participants engaged in a structured discussion of the program and it's design. The convention indicated the program as a diversity session, NASP's strategic goal to address racial, linguistic, cultural, and sexual orientation issues (NASP, 2010). Of the many professional experiences available at the NASP convention, the student mentoring program is a unique pairing of graduate students with school psychologists from across the United States. #### Protecting Sexual Minority Youth in Our Schools

On Tuesday, April 20<sup>th</sup>, 2010, the School & Community Psychology Program and SPLASH sponsored a bullying workshop on *Protecting Sexual Minority Youth in Our Schools* presented by Dr. Silvia Pastor and Dr. Joseph Petrino.

The free workshop attracted many students from school psychology, counseling, education, and marriage & family therapy, along with outside school faculty and professors.

The workshop was extremely interactive and participants engaged in a collaborative discussion on bullying and the LGBT population. In this educational session, participants explored facts on bullying, shed light on recent bullying/cyberbullying cases, and gained resources for educational-based strategies and interventions to decrease verbal and physical harassment and increase school safety for sexual minority youth.

The College of Education and Human Services is a New Jersey Professional Development Provider and participants were provided with documentation of two hours continuing education credit (CEC's).

Thanks to this great evening, attendee's are equipped with basic knowledge on what bullying is, how it directly effects sexual minority youth, and some tips on what to do about it. Most importantly, all who attended have been made aware and therefore have a responsibility to try and put an end to it!

### **SPLASH Welcomes Pearson!**

On March 31, 2010, SPLASH members had the opportunity to attend the Wechsler Individual Achievement Test (WIAT-III) workshop presented by Jim Simone.

The assessment is a norm referenced tool and is used for individuals in preschool through age 16. On the WIAT-III are 5 new subtests that have been added for grades kindergarten to third grade, which include oral reading fluency, math fluency addition, math fluency subtraction, math fluency multiplication and early reading skills. The assessment measures skills in each of the 5 domains: listening, speaking, reading, writing, and math with standard revisions.

In a collaborative discussion, participants (1) gained information about the WIAT-III and its application to identify the academic strengths and weaknesses of a student, (2) learned how the WIAT-III can be used to inform decisions regarding eligibility for educational services and placement, and (3) were introduced to the hand scoring and Scoring Assistant software (Pearson, 2009).

## Advocacy: NASP & Communiqué Reflection


After reading the three articles in the advocacy section of the latest edition of *Communiqué* and the Advocacy page on NASP's website, there are several current items of which we should be aware.

First, the 5th anniversary of the National Children's Mental Health Awareness Day is on May 6, 2010. The aim of the day is to raise "awareness of effective programs for children's mental health needs; demonstrate how children's mental health initiatives promote positive youth development, recovery and resilience; and show how children with mental health needs thrive in their communities." Check out the three activities that are leading up to the Awareness Day ("The Post Now E-Viral Campaign", "My Feelings Are a Work of Art-Art Action", and "When I Grow Up-Youth Action") and help shed a positive light on issues related to children's mental health!

Another important upcoming event to explore further is the Public Policy Institute (PPI) in Washington D.C. that is co-hosted by NASP and George Washington University Graduate School in Education and Human Development. School psychology students can attend this conference to further develop competencies that will focus on Safe & Healthy Environments for Educating the Whole Child and discussions will include policy and legislative goals in promoting psychological practices. You can choose from a 3-day basic training from July 7-9, 2010 or a 5-day advanced training from July 7-9 & July 12-13.

In addition, it is important that school psychology graduate students join as a student affiliate in APA's Division 16 as the goals and objectives resonate with the domains of school psychology. The New Jersey Association of School Psychologists, Annual Spring Conference was held on Friday May 7<sup>th</sup> at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Jamesburg, NJ. There were about 7 students in attendance representing Seton Hall and SPLASH as well as Program Director, Dr. Massarelli.

School psychologists as well as future school psychologists gathered for breakfast at about 8:30am. The speaker of the day was Signe Whitson, coauthor of the book "The Angry Smile" and the lecture focused on passive aggressive behavior. The morning portion of the presentation centered on the different types of passive aggressive behaviors and how to recognize the behaviors in everyone from to students, to co-workers, to parents, to yourself.

The lunch break included an awards ceremony, which honored New Jersey School Psychologist of the Year Mary Duffy (school psychologist at Mainland Regional High School), various other educators throughout the state, and the NJASP minority scholarship recipient.
