JEWISH EDUCATION DURING THE NAZI PERIOD AND HOLOCAUST EDUCATION TODAY

In 1933 the first legislative acts of the National Socialist government in Germany included an attack on Jewish presence in schools and universities. Increasingly over the next few years the laws and practices of the majority population left the Jewish community in isolation. Jewish resistance to the exclusion from the benefits of an education for children and young adults took many forms.

Two experts will help show us how the study of the Shoah (Holocaust) at age-appropriate levels can be enhanced to meet the needs of our day in the context of current anti-Jewish bigotry.

Dr. Marion Kaplan will present an overview of the ways that educators and parents worked with a variety of initiatives to overcome the isolation of Jewish children from the general culture and to emphasize the foundation that Jewish educational principles and values provided to cope with difficult times.

Dr. Thomas Fallace will discuss the history of Holocaust and Genocide Education in New Jersey, which has become a model for the nation.

Marion Kaplan, Ph.D. is Skirball Professor of Modern Jewish History at New York University and has received the National Jewish Book Award for *Gender and Jewish History* (with Deborah Dash Moore, 2011), Between Dignity and Despair: Jewish Life in Nazi Germany (1998) and The Making of the Jewish Middle Class: Women, Family and Identity in Imperial Germany (1991). Her newest book, Hitler's Jewish Refugees: Hope and Anxiety in Portugal, 1940-45, was published by Yale University Press in 2020.



Thomas Fallace, Ph.D. is Professor of Education at William Paterson University and has published several books on the history of education in the United States during the early 20th century, including In the Shadow of Authoritarianism: American Education in the Twentieth Century (2018) and The Emergence of Holocaust Education in American Schools (2008).
